Spring Hazards

Spring is a beautiful season, with blooming flowers and warmer weather. We dust off our homes and throw open our windows. But for our feline friends, spring brings a number of hazards:

- Flowers a number of flowers and plants are toxic to cats, such as lilies, tulip bulbs, and azaleas
- Screens in windows make sure all are installed tightly and are made of sturdy material
- Cleaning products as you break out the cleaning supplies, be aware of where your kitties are and consider pet-friendly options

Kitten Season Updates: What to Do If You Find Kittens

This time of year, a common question we receive is: what do I do if I find a litter of kittens?

Do not disturb the kittens immediately. Wait and watch. Is the mother cat around? If so, and if the mother is friendly, it is best to keep her and the kittens together until the kittens are 8 weeks old. If the mother is friendly, notify your local shelter of a stray cat or take to a nearby vet to scan fora microchip.

If no mother is visible, give her several hours to return before scooping up the kittens. If kittens are left in a box, they were likely abandoned - but monitor before removing in case a mother returns. Kittens who are clean and quiet likely have a mother around.

Call your local animal control. Note age of mother and kittens, stray or feral (eye contact and approachability are good indicators for judging), and whether there is any need for immediate medical care.

- Give an old toy new life as a chaser toy by tying string around it
